


VISION4 RONETWORK



What we've heard

- 1. 94% of crashes are caused by human behavior (error or poor choice)
- 2. Distracted travelling is an increasing problem in crash causes
- 3. Pedestrians don't use crosswalks to cross the street
- 4. Bicyclists disobey the law
- 5. Drivers tend to drive too fast for conditions
- 6. Aggressive driving is an increasing issue
- 7. Resources for law enforcement are limited
- 8. The majority of people don't know or understand traffic laws















PLEDGE

Through the adoption of a Vision Zero Action Plan, the City of Orlando has joined a world-wide effort to eliminate traffic statilises and severe injuries. The City Transportation Department is sharing their commitment to prioritize safety in the transportation system and improve roadway conditions for all residents and visitors no matter what mode of transportation they choose. This goal can be better achieved by recognising that tragedies on our roads are not acceptable, and in fact, are preventable. This means that we can no longer perceive "crashes" as "accidents." While human error may be inevitable, we need to predict and plan for error on Orlando's roads to encourage safe decision making. And we should work proactively together as a community to provide proven solutions that eliminate dangerous roadway behavior and crashes.

To do this, we need to adopt and implement solutions that make our streets safer. We also need to accept individual responsibility for our actions on the road. Whether you commute by car, bus, bicyc or walk, you should follow safe behaviors and become an advocate for others doing the same:

We need to work together to create a culture of conscientious commuters in Orlando who become active participants in the goal to eliminate traffic deaths and serious injuries by 2040.

Join us together is this Vision. Do your part. Take the Vision Zero Orlando Pledge

I pledge to myself, my loved ones and my community to:

- Prioritize life and health. Recognize human vulnerability. Make traffic safety personal. Everyone on our roads – all walkers, bikers, transit takers and drivers – are loved by someone. Protect our families and communities from traffic tragedies and help everyone to return homesafely.
- Stay calm. Do not succumb to road rage. Aggressive driving increases the risk of harming
 yourself and others. Know that feelings of road rage increase the likelihood of human error
 and stop it in its track.
- Stay focused. Be responsible and put your phone and all electronic devices away when driving
 Do not allow yourself to become distracted by outside factors. Be attentive to the road and
 other persons on the road.

- Slow down. Speed is a predictor of crash survival. Driving at higher speeds increases the risk
 for fatalities and severe injuries. Slowing down saves lives for both those persons walking or
 biking without the projection and persons behind the wheel.
- Travel sober. Driving while under the influence is a high-risk behavior that is unacceptable and
 a known danger not only to yourself, but all other road users. Have a designated driver or
 choose to share a rider state than get behind the when.
- Be responsible. Wear your seatbelt. Wear a helmet. Abide by traffic laws and respect the
 rules of the road. Protective devices and laws are proven to save lives and can save your own
- Be a leader. Provide feedback on locations where enforcement or the installation of safe transportation solutions can have the greatest effect in saving lives and preventing serious injuries. Report unsafe conditions and provide information on locations where there are high rates of crashes or dangerous behaviors.
- Be a Vision Zero Orlando advocate. Encourage others to take the Vision Zero Pledge. Spread
 the word about Vision Zero, which takes a proactive, preventative approach and sees traffic
 safety as a public health issue.
